Global macro developments

US GDP fell 0.5% annualized in Q1 before rebounding 3.3% annualized in Q2. A pull forward of imports to get ahead of US tariff implementation was the main factor. Looking through the trade effect, US domestic demand slowed from near 3% to around 1.5% annualized Q4 2024 to Q2 2025.

The Federal Reserve's July Beige Book highlighted that businesses are attempting to stagger tariff passthrough and, where possible, cut other costs to offset. Still, six-month annualised core goods CPI inflation has risen from 0% at December to 1.1% in July. Producer prices also beat expectations in July, and tariff rates rose significantly in August as President Trump's trade truce ended. Also pressured by constrained capacity, annual US inflation is expected to hold around 3.0% into 2026.


Critical to the medium-term outlook for the US is the degree to which households feel the cost of tariffs not only through elevated inflation and interest rates but also labour market weakness, employment growth having already slowed abruptly in 2025.

Nonetheless, global growth remains robust around 3.0%. Euro Area growth is accelerating towards trend, and China is on track for a 5.0% gain. Conditions across the rest of Asia are buoyant and many other emerging markets hold significant promise. Broadly, downside risks can be managed by policy.



US underlying growth slowed in H1 2025


United States Contributions to GDP





US inflation at risk from tariffs and capacity constraints


United States goods and services prices






US labour market has lost momentum...

US Non-farm Payrolls




Labour market outlook - survey data





China is maintaining a 5% growth pace despite tariffs...


China GDP YTD

Trade flows since Liberation Day

Having surged ahead of Liberation Day, US imports fell back in Q2, narrowing the US trade deficit. The biggest declines were seen in consumer goods, vehicles and industrial supplies.

Providing a degree of certainty over trade terms hence, the US have signed several high-level agreements, including:

- United Kingdom: a 10% baseline tariff; a 10% tariff on the first 100k cars; and a 25% rate for steel and aluminium. Preferential treatment for pharmaceuticals has been discussed but not agreed.
- European Union: a 15% baseline tariff; 15% on cars, auto parts and pharmaceuticals; and Most Favoured Nation (MFN) status. In return, the EU has committed to buy \$750bn of US energy goods and \$40bn of AI chips.
- Japan: a 15% baseline tariff and MFN status, including for cars. Steel and aluminium tariffs remain at 50%, however. \$550bn has been committed to be invested in the US, principally via loans and guarantees.

Despite the agreed truce, import tariffs between the US and China have increased significantly in 2025. Currently, the effective US tariff on Chinese imports is close to 60%, almost three times the rate of 2024. Chinese exports to the US have suffered but rising exports to the rest of Asia and other emerging markets are offsetting. Expanding trade linkages and large-scale investment by China suggests this trend will continue in the medium-to-long term.

After a relatively stable 2024, Australia's goods trade balance has been volatile in 2025. Australia's US tariff is the lowest possible at 10%. Like the rest of the world, Australian exports to the US spiked at the start of the year and have normalised since, with no significant negative impact to date. More broadly, Australia's major commodity exports declined in Q1, but the latest data are signalling a recovery in Q2, mainly thanks to iron ore and LNG.




US Imports by category





Chinese exports to Asia have offset loss from US tariffs


China exports by country*






Europe's exports to the US reversed in Q2

EU exports to the US









Australian trade: monthly flows have been volatile

Value, \$bn








Australian exports to US have returned to H2 2024 levels


Australia Goods Exports to the US*





Iron ore and LNG exports bounced back in Q2


Big 3 Commodity Export Volumes
